- Damian Crowe: I went to a public High School in a rural community. It was one of the top schools in Victoria at the time in both the public and private sectors.

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00:37:50 Martin Connolly: Sooner or later, this talk will turn to resources and govt funding. I'd like to register the fact that Australia has a fiat currency (not tied to gold etc or other currencies) and the federal govt can go into, and remain in, deficits without ever 'paying it back'. General acknowledgement of this would allow federal govt to provide a lot more funding to education at all levels. One example - many decision-makers today had free university education; now students are crippled with debt. Economics hasn't changed, just the politics. Since the 70s-80s, neoliberal economic has been rammed down out throats - this MUST change!



00:52:30 john canning: electrostimulation has been shown to accelerate catch up of US navy personnel to perform better on IQ tests so all is not lost...!




01:05:27 john canning: The private schools say exactly that - that's why they are there to create their own distinct community and advantages to help their kids defeat the outside world!

In some communities the lack of access to CRTs will mean we may not be able to offer programs .
